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Lately, it seems to me that more and more people are telling me that they feel that their lives are "too busy" - we feel trapped by our "schedules." We don't feel as though we can do the things we WANT to do - we are too busy doing the things we HAVE to do (or the things we THINK we have to do.) It's as true for me as for you.

These days there are so many good opportunities. Our children can choose to be a part of teams that range from soccer to tennis, basketball, softball, golf, football, swimming, wrestling, gymnastics, and lots more. There are music, dance, and theater possibilities. And so much more. It's hard to choose, so we try to do it all.

It is no different for adults. Many of us feel as though it's time to stop, but we don't know what we could let go. The demands of work and family keep us on the treadmill, with little opportunity for rest and recreation.

As we come to the holiday season, the issue of busyness and stress often overshadows our ability to find joy in the true meaning of both Thanksgiving and Christmas.

The scriptures have something to say about all this. The commandment to "honor the Sabbath" is one of the most ancient practices of our faith. It is also one of the ones that we are most overtly resistant to in our culture. We are too busy to set aside a day for rest and renewal. If truth be told, we don't know

how. We associate observing the Sabbath with a rigid understanding of enforced boredom - a day where only the Bible can be read, or when worship services stretch out all day long.

Observing the Sabbath is much more than that. It is really about building rest into the fabric of our lives in a disciplined and regular way. It is about ceasing to produce, in order to just be. What if "Sabbath" was a day - every week - when we did not watch television, or did not go shopping, or did not get on the internet? What if "Sabbath" was a day - every week - when relationships became more important than work - either at the office or at home? What if "Sabbath" was a day - every week - when the disciplines of worship and rest combined to renew our spirits for the work of the coming week?

Life might be just as full, but perhaps we would feel less pressured! The commandment to honor the Sabbath is more than a suggestion! Maybe we should all try it!

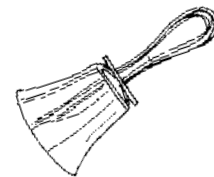
## **InterFaith Service of Thanksgiving**

## **You Make it Happen!**

Every year we come around to the time for the Stewardship Campaign, and we ask ourselves the question - how much should we give to the church? It's a good question, and there are multiple ways to answer it.

The scriptures invite us to give a tithe. In the Bible, that meant 10% of our income. With all the financial pressures that we live with today, a 5% tithe would be a wonderful gift. But if that isn't possible, find a percentage that "works" in your budget, and consider that your gift to God for the work of God's kingdom on earth.

Another way to answer the question about giving is to ask another question - how much is needed? The needs in our church are growing. We have a high expectation of care and leadership from our staff, but we pay some of our supporting staff VERY poorly. Our Caregiver Coordinator and our Membership Coordinator both practically donate their time. Each year, raises are the last on the list, and the Church Council believes that we must begin the work of providing equitable pay for our staff. Between that challenge, and other normal increases, our Treasurer thinks that we will need \$30,000 more in 2008 than we did in 2007. That's a substantial increase, and it won't happen unless we all pitch in!

## **Stone Soup**

The story of Stone Soup reminds us all that wonderful things happen when everyone brings something to add to the soup. That's the story of Stewardship at Edwards as well. We each bring what we can. Stewardship Sunday will be November 11<sup>th</sup>. You'll get a pledge card in the mail, which you can either return to the church office by mail or bring with you to worship on November 11.

## **Lifestraws**

An estimated 1.8 million people die each year from preventable water-borne diseases; one child dies every 15 seconds from water-related disease. **Rachael Sedgwich** came to church one Wednesday evening last spring with a solution, a smile and a question - *Could Edwards purchase LifeStraws to send to folks who need clean water?* On Sunday, October 14<sup>th</sup>, the people of Edwards answered, "Yes!" and during potluck over \$500 was donated to this incredible cause.

**LifeStraw** is a water purification tool that can be carried around a person's neck and is especially useful in developing countries where clean drinking water is unavailable. One **LifeStraw** costs \$3 and will provide about 2 liters of clean drinking water a day for one year.

**LifeStraw** is designed and manufactured by Vestergaard Frandsen, Inc., also the maker of insecticide-treated bed nets for controlling malaria.

Our donations will provide an emergency measure to help stem the spread of cholera in parts of the Democratic Republic of Congo. We will send our donations to Interchurch Medical Assistance World Health, who will purchase and distribute the **LifeStraws** to the DR Congo. The IMA World Health is a highly regarded charity affiliated with Global Ministries and the United Church of Christ. They have received a 5-star rating from MinistryWatch and an "exceptional rating" by Charity Navigator.

Donations are still coming in and Rachael and the children of Edwards are making plans to take their "LifeStraw" message out into the wider community. Let's continue to support this life saving project.

## *Cash Flow Squeeze Delays OCWM Payment; Forecast for 2007 Shows Small Deficit*

In January the congregation approved a 2007 budget that showed a \$16,500 deficit. Based on our success in recent years, we all had faith that the situation would improve during the year. And it has -- most people are current with pledges, there has been another increase in non-pledge giving, the staff continues to be conscientious in their spending, and the congregation has generously given to special projects. This has improved the situation considerably, but we still forecast a deficit of around \$4,000 for the full year of 2007.

We are able to pay most bills despite the deficit. However, we do not have enough cash to make the 3rd quarter OCWM payment.

What do we ask from you?

- \* If you will not be able to fulfill your pledge for 2007, please inform Clyde Durrhah or Elisabeth Norwood as soon as possible.
